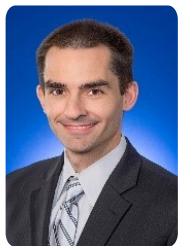

Robert Markette, Jr., JD, CHC, HCS-C

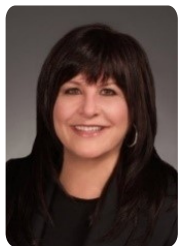
